Global Humanitarian Assistance Report

- International humanitarian assistance a new high of an estimated US\$27.3 billion in 2017.
- Only <u>0.4%</u> of humanitarian aid is channeled directly to Local NGOs and Civil Society
 Organizations and local and national responders received <u>2.9 %</u> Of total international humanitarian assistance in 2017


Key Findings of Crescendo International Report 2015

- The local and national organizations were largely marginalized from the overall humanitarian response decision-making process
- Local Organizations have a strong desire to grow and strengthen their capacities and play a bigger role

Significance



APP supports *localization* as a process in which local, sub-national and national humanitarian actors, namely governments, civil society and non-government organizations, the private sector, media, academia etc., are taking a *lead role*, in a *collaborative manner* to plan and implement priority actions in disaster preparedness, humanitarian response and recovery through mobilizing internal resources and external humanitarian funding


APP is working towards localizing DRR actions







Approach









Changes at 3 levels


- Engagement of individual champions;
- Strengthening local humanitarian organizations; and
- Strengthening locally led systems


- Government mandated to implement and maintain disaster management mechanisms
- Local NGOs/CSOs closest ties with communities and often the first responders during emergencies
- Private Sector supporting communities in disaster response through CSR



Key Achievements

- Functioning Multi-Stakeholder Partnerships at Regional and National Levels
- Adopted participatory approaches for designing and implementation of roadmaps and action plans for the countries leading to better coordination between the stakeholders









- Built a pool of ready expertise and strengthened capacity of the local actors through capacity development programs at different levels through priority trainings and learning actions
- Advanced channels of knowledge creation, sharing and regional cooperation through South-South Cooperation and Knowledge Exchange
- Engaged private sector in disaster management by creating enabling environment and facilitating dialogue between the relevant stakeholders across different sectors.





Some Snapshots





Cambodia - first time that the private sector is on board; awareness on business resilience

Myanmar - enhanced coordination between stakeholders from different sectors during the time of disaster in Pyay, Falam and Kathar districts.

Nepal - trainings on Protection Against Lightening helped integrate PaL in university curriculum; government to include it in the building codes

Pakistan - revision of Pakistan's National Disaster Response Plan (NDRP); launch of "Humanitarian Resilience Journal"

Philippines- trainings business resilience for MSMEs; rights based approached to humanitarian response and psychosocial support to responders, volunteers and affected populations after Typhoon Mongkut

Sri Lanka - comprehensive preparedness plan developed for Kalutara district in consultation with all stakeholders; upgrading school facilities as safe shelter


